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PARSHAS MISPHATIM

This week's Parshah warns us against causing pain toward orphans and widows (*Exodus 22:21-22*): *You shall not cause pain to any widow or orphan. If you cause him pain... — for if he shall cry out to Me, I shall surely hear his outcry.*

Rashi explains that this prohibition against causing pain applies to *all* people. The Torah only mentions orphans and widows because it often speaks in the most prevalent case—and vulnerable individuals are often targeted.

Rabbeinu Bechayei, however, suggests an alternative explanation: The Torah singles out widows and orphans because their inherent vulnerability makes their suffering even more severe.

Based on this, Rabbeinu Bechayei explains the end of the verse — *for if he shall cry out to Me, I shall surely hear his outcry*. On a basic level, this is a form of "*midah k'neged midah*," measure for measure punishment: Since this person caused this orphan or widow pain, Hashem guarantees that he too will be punished.

Yet a closer look at the verse reveals that the Torah is stressing that the orphan or widow's pleas *will surely be listened to*. In other words, this is not to punish the offender per se, but rather because Hashem "will surely" listen to the widow and the orphan. But why is it that their cries are given special attention?

Rabbeinu Bechayei offers a profound insight: When most people are hurt, they instinctively look toward a "savior" to save them: a strong friend, or a powerful person to exact revenge on their behalf.

Yet for the widow and orphan — they do not have that. *Their only recourse is to turn to Hashem* in pain—Who will surely hear his outcry.

While this reinforces our responsibility to show extra sensitivity towards orphans and widows, we can also learn another powerful lesson as well. When we realize that we have no one to rely on, no one to cry to, and no one to turn to but Hashem, —*He will surely hear our cry*, May it be speedily in our days, Amen!
