PARSHAS YISRO

The Mechilta (an early commentary on the Torah) on this week's Parshah teaches us that the Ten Commandments were given to Moshe on two tablets, placed next to each other.

On one tablet, in descending order, were: (1) *Anochi Hashem* – "I am Hashem"; (2) *Lo Yihyeh Lecha Elohim Acherim* – "You shall have no other gods"; (3) *Lo Tisa Es Shem Hashem La'shav* – "Do not take Hashem's Name in vain"; (4) *Zachor Es Yom HaShabbos* – "Remember the Sabbath day"; (5) *Kabbeid Et Avicha V'Imecha* – "Honor your father and mother."

And on the other tablet, also in descending order, were: (6) *Lo Tirtzach* – "Do not murder"; (7) *Lo Tinof* - Do not engage in illicit relations; (8) *Lo Tignov* – "Do not steal"; (9) *Lo Ta'aneh B'Rei'echa Ed Sheker* – Do not bear false testimony; (10) *Lo Sachmod* – "Do not covet."

The Mechilta explains that these pairings – i.e. (1) across from (6) – are not random. Rather, this is to teach us that someone who kills is, in essence, denying Hashem's existence ; someone who worships idols is akin to engaging in illicit relations; and someone who steals will ultimately take Hashem's Name in vain, and so on and so forth.

While it is clear that there is a direct linkage from one to the other, there is a broader lesson here as well.

We often think of Judaism as having two separate areas of service: *Bein Adam LaMakom* – our obligations to Hashem, and *Bein Adam L'Chaveiro* – our obligations to other people.

At first glance, they might seem unrelated. Someone could be very generous, yet not focused on serving Hashem properly. Or they could be deeply involved in learning and prayer, but insensitive to others.

The Torah teaches us otherwise: the two are deeply intertwined. Strengthening one naturally strengthens the other; neglecting one weakens the other.

But why is this so? Because the Torah is not just a list of rules—it is a blueprint for becoming a complete, perfected person. Every mitzvah contributes to this spiritual building, and every sin detracts from it. The ultimate goal is a person who excels in all aspects of life—both in their relationship with Hashem and with fellow humans.

By showing us the connection between the tablets, the Torah is teaching us that the purpose of our observance is not simply to "check off" commandments or avoid sins.

Rather, as Hashem commanded us just before giving us the Torah: "*And you shall be to Me a kingdom of priests and a holy nation.*"
